PRE CSW67 MEETING

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Some excerpts

- Girls are to be **given special support** in digital technologies at **school** to close the digital Gender Gap.
- **Access to tech** It was noted that in rural areas globally, school enrollment fluctuates in boys' 46% and girls' 38%, but girls may drop out due to expectations at home and issues of feminine hygiene.
- Participants highlighted the issues of online sexual harassment and abuse, virtual stalking, and gender-based violence and called for **international recommendations on online gender-based violence.**

Breakfast Briefing with Ambassadors (con't)

- **Access to digital technology** is available to a large majority for women and girls in developed countries. However, access is more difficult in developing countries due to a lack of infrastructure, such as electricity.
- All participants found it problematic that the **STEM field** is dominated by men and that there are too few women...and in social professions, too few men.
- **Stereotypes** make it difficult for women and girls to access digital technologies.
- **Female role models** are scarce and should be encouraged so that more girls enter STEM professions.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR “ZERO DRAFT” NGO CSW GLOBAL “ADVOCACY RESEARCH GROUP”*

- Provide digital fluency skills
- Develop international guidelines to address risks to dignity of women and girls
- Ensure access to infrastructure, electricity, rural, design that respects all
Enhance development assistance, improve finance and partnership
- Engage with girls and young women in development of policies and programs for STEM education, addressing unequal gender norms

- Girls are the world’s future leading force in technology and innovation, intersectoral collaboration to prevent the digital revolution from leaving them behind, needing:
- Promote policies to influence from within, educate, encourage youth to become developers, designers, coders. Importance of mentoring
- Deep investment in communities and families so that learning and IT does not involve risks to women and girls' safety. Counter negative social norms. Awareness campaign, Involve men and boys.
- Channeling flexible resources to CSOs as they advocate for change, esp in humanitarian crises

- Promote policies in STEM and IT fields, allowing more women / girls access. advocacy for distance learning.
- Public/ private collaboration for zero tolerance to Violence ag Women and Girls, esp as it is multiplied through internet
- Young women’s ensured access to digital platforms as tools for expression and political participation, leadership
- Support for government/ UN developed apps for early childhood education and discovering new learning styles, trainings, esp in rural areas
- 90 % new jobs require digital skills, government and private sector deliver services digitally. Reduce gender gap in internet access.

The GUIDE: AGREED CONCLUSIONS CSW67

Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls

CSW67 Agreed Conclusions

1. The Commission on the Status of Women reaffirms the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, the outcome documents of the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly and the declarations adopted by the Commission on the occasion of the tenth, fifteenth, twentieth and twenty-fifth anniversaries of the Fourth World Conference on Women, and stresses the need to further strengthen their implementation.

2. The Commission reiterates that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women and the Convention on the Rights of the Child, and the Optional Protocols thereto, as well as other relevant conventions and treaties, such as the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination and the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families provide an international legal framework and a comprehensive set of measures for realizing gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls and the full and equal enjoyment of all human rights and fundamental freedoms by all women and girls, throughout their life course.

3. The Commission reaffirms that the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and the outcome documents of its reviews, and the outcomes of relevant major United Nations conferences and summits and the follow-up to those conferences and summits, have laid a solid foundation for sustainable development and that the full, effective and accelerated implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action will make a crucial contribution to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and to achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls.

86. The Commission urges governments at all levels and as appropriate, with the relevant entities of the United Nations system and international and regional organizations, within their respective mandates and bearing in mind national priorities, and invites civil society, inter alia, women's organizations, youth-led organizations, feminist groups, faith-based organizations, the private sector and national human rights institutions, where they exist, and other relevant stakeholders, as applicable, to take the following actions:

- 2. Leveraging financing for inclusive digital transformation and innovation towards achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls*
- 3. Fostering gender-responsive digital and science and technology education in the digital age*
- 4. Promoting the full, equal and meaningful participation and leadership as well as full employment of women in technology and innovation*

5. *Adopting gender-responsive technology design, development and deployment*
6. *Strengthening fairness, transparency and accountability in the digital age*
